I know, I know...It is going to be December, we are not supposed to go backwards to Thanksgiving. Right!? Well, I am actually going backwards in order to go forward.

When a pitcher is on the mound at a baseball game he places the ball into his glove as he comes to a military-like attention stance on top of the pitcher's plate. He peers, usually by squinting his eyes, to the catcher to see what sign the catcher is making. He is trying to see what pitch the catcher is requesting he throw. Either shaking his head "yes" or "no" the pitcher agrees or disagrees. Soon after agreement something weird happens – the pitcher moves his head around, especially if there are base runners around, and then moves backwards. After all of this there is forward momentum until the ball is released.

This is the first stint for a bundle of energy known as Tommie Ann Grinnell who handles the Newcomers Welcome vestry slot for the members of St. Francis. She was born for the task, being blessed with a smile that welcomes a response. She was born near Abilene, Texas and grew up as a "Cradle Catholic". She was one of five children and went to school in Clyde, Texas.

Wonder who has stuffed those "goodie bags" on the shelf in the Narthex for two years? It's Tommie Ann. She sends welcome notes and maintains contact with newcomers and helps them assimilate into the St. Francis family. She is currently working with Outreach Minister Bob Gray in hosting newcomer dinners and coffees, and as duties are further defined for the two of them her work with newcomers will continue.

Tommie Ann earned her undergraduate degree in education from Texas A&M. Her first teaching job was in Lamesa, Texas, where she taught third grade for two years. She then moved to Lubbock, Texas where she worked as a children's library assistant. It was there that she met her husband, Mike, who was choir director at the Catholic church she attended. 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
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
